LEPIDOPTERA (Butterflies and Moths), 1953

January. Anticyclonic weather predominated, resulting in a rainfall of only 18% of the average: temperature was somewhat below normal but the last week was very mild, with a screen reading of 57 deg. on 29th. Sunshine was only 64% of the average. Winter Moths persisted at light until 12th, and the Pale Brindled Beauty appeared on 10th and 12th. On the warm night of 29th Conistra vaccinii (Chestnut) came out from hybernation. Depressaria applana and D. yeatiana were less common than usual.

February gave plenty of variety, so far as the weather was concerned: the first half was very cold and the second half very mild. Rainfall was 66% of average, and practically all of it occurred in the latter half of the month. Sunshine was about average, but it was really confined to the 1st and last weeks. The Small Tortoiseshell Butterfly was first seen on 22nd, and the Peacock on 27th. Single specimens of the Common Quaker and the Early Moth came to light, and Ypsolophus mucronellus was taken on an Apple trunk at Bickenhall on 25th.

March. The mean pressure was remarkably high (during the first fortnight it was 1040 mbrs.), producing persistent thick fog, and low temperatures, but later sunshine records were high. Rainfall was again much below the average—35%. Owing to the cold nights the light traps produced little of interest, until the end of the month, when the 'Sallow-feeders' began to arrive in fair numbers—Orthosia gothica (Hebrew Character), O. cruda (Small Quaker), Xylocampa areola (Early Grey), etc.

April shared with October in being the only two wet months of this very dry year. Rainfall was about 1½ times the normal, and it was a cold month, although sunshine was just average. Among the butterflies, Peacocks and Small Tortoiseshells were now well out, and other newcomers were Speckled Wood, Comma, Brim-

stone and Orange-tip. The moths noted in March continued to arrive at the traps, and other interesting species included:—

May proved to be average in all respects, although there were some very warm nights towards the end of the month. The most noteworthy event this month was the capture at m.v. light of a female of the beautiful Crimson Speckled Moth at Taunton: a specimen was recorded from Burnham-on-Sea in 1933. A perfect Pyrausta nigrata was captured at Walton, the other record for the County being long ago, and mentioned in the Victoria County History. Among other captures may be mentioned:—

June was generally a dull month, with rainfall somewhat above the average, a large deficiency of sunshine, and very low temperatures. (A maximum of 56% was the lowest at Bickenhall since 1921). A perfect male of the *Alder Kitten came to m.v. light at Bickenhall on 5th. This is a new county record. Hypsopygia glaucinalis, a moth usually associated with old haystacks, came to light at Bickenhall; it was reported from Shapwick many years ago; Argyroploce rosaceana was also taken at Bickenhall; there is only one other record for the county—Blue Anchor in 1913. Pyrrhia umbra (Bordered Sallow) was taken at Frome, it does not appear to have been recorded since 1920. A specimen of the Longhorn Moth Nemophora degeerella was taken at Luccombe, last reported from Withycombe in 1913.

July. The days were cool, but the nights relatively warm, and this gave a temperature near the average. Sunshine was just about normal, but rainfall was below, amounting to 88%. A feature of the month was the low intensity of the sunlight. Nothing really exciting was reported, but at Bickenhall, the following moths came to the traps:—

Euphyia cuculata (Royal Mantle). A single specimen was taken in similar circumstances last year, otherwise there have been no records for many years.

Yponomeuta evonymella: the last record was at Taunton in 1913.

August. Sunshine was somewhat above average and rainfall slightly below, otherwise an average month. The Monarch Butterfly was seen at Upton (P. E. Smart); hardly a year passes now without this species turning up somewhere. The Brown Hairstreak was again about in small numbers at Bickenhall. Laphygma exigua (the immigrant Small Mottled Willow) turned up at Weston-super-Mare, and the usually uncommon "Pinion" moths Cosmia pyralina and C. diffinis were both reported: C. pyralina was taken at m.v. light at Frome, and C. diffinis turned up in numbers at Bickenhall. Of the former there is only a very doubtful record many years ago, and the latter has been recorded from Cannington. Nephopteryx semirubella was taken at Compton Dundon; this moth has not been reported since 1933, when it was taken at Shapwick. The following came to light at Bickenhall:—

Whilst at Taunton a specimen of *Chilodes maritima* (Silky Wainscot) was taken at m.v. light; last recorded at Bridgwater in 1922.

September was another average month with prevailing southerly winds and nights free from early frosts. The Striped Hawk-moth was seen at Weston-super-Mare, but otherwise there were no

reports of unusual captures. Among the commoner autumn visitors to light at Bickenhall may be mentioned:—

and Anthophila pariana, a little moth which generally flies in bright sunshine; it was taken at Bickenhall in 1948, and had not been seen since. It now turned up in numbers in the light-trap.

October. The first half was very dry, but later there was much rain, which caused the month's total to be the highest of the whole year. Sunshine was about average. Nothing of interest was reported, but a specimen of Peronea boscana was taken at Bickenhall.

November. A very dry and quiet month, with temperatures round the normal. The rainfall was only 59% of the average. Many of the autumn butterflies and moths persisted throughout the month. Lithophane socia (Pale Pinion) was taken in the house at Bickenhall.

December proved to be one of the mildest on record. On the 2nd and 3rd the thermometer reached 58 deg., and at night did not fall below 55. The month was also excessively dry with rainfall only 26% of the average. The December Moth was about nearly until the new year, whilst the Silver Y and Nomophila noctuella were seen at Bickenhall as late as 13th. Erannis aurantiaria (Scarce Umber) and Exapate congelatella were both common at light.

COLEOPTERA (Beetles), 1953.

The following selection has been made from the species found this year and is based mainly on the local occurrence of the insect or some point of interest in its habitat.

Staphylinoidea.

*Calyptomerus dubius (Marsh). North Hill, Minehead. In vegetable refuse, August. The Clambidae are minute convex insects and have the power of rolling themselves up into a ball.

Scydmaenus tarsatus Müll. North Hill, Minehead. In decayed grass-cuttings, July, August. Fairly common in Southern and Midland counties; rarer further north and in Scotland.

North Hill, Minehead. In vege-

Metopsia clypeata (Müll).

*Megarthrus denticollis (Beck). table refuse, July, August.

*M. affinis Mill. denticollis is rather rare in the south and common further north. The distribution of M. affinis is the reverse; not recorded from Scotland although not uncommon in England.

Eusphalerum primulae (Steph.). Asham Woods, Downhead. In primrose flowers, May. Previously recorded in similar habitat at Long Ashton between 1914-16 (C. T. Gimingham, Ent. mon.

Mag. 55).

- *Stenus guynemeri du Val. Horner Woods. Under stones by edge of stream, May. Local and chiefly found in hilly and mountainous districts.
- *Dianous coerulescens (Gyll). Alcombe and Holford. Under stones by edge of swiftly running streams, sometimes partly submerged. The species is sub-aquatic.
- *Quedius lateralis (Gr.). Crowcombe. Feeding on decaying fungi, September.
- *Philonthus sanguinolentus (Gr.). Walton Heath. Swept from dykeside vegetation, July.
- *Autalia impressa (Ol.). North Hill, Minehead; Crowcombe. In decaying fungi, September.
- *A. rivularis (Gr.). North Hill, Minehead. In decayed grass cuttings, September.
- *Euplectus sanguineus Denny. North Hill, Minehead. In vegetable refuse, July, September.

Clavicornia.

*Nemosoma elongatum (L.). Wembdon Hill. Under bark on old wooden fence, April. Parasitic on *Pteleobius vittatus* (F.) of which several dead specimens were found in the burrows. "Of very rare occurrence, but sometimes locally common" (Fowler).

Pocadius ferrugineus (F.).

North Hill, Minehead. In Lycoperdina bovistae (F.).

North Hill, Minehead. In Lycoperdons (puff-balls), October.

- *Cryptophagus lycoperdi (Scop.). The first two species previously recorded in similar habitat at Long Ashton between 1914-16 (C. T. Gimingham, Ent. mon. Mag. 55).
- *Rhizophagus ferrugineus (Pk.). Horner Woods. Under bark of old log, May.

Monotoma picipes Hbst.

M. bicolor Villa.

North Hill, Minehead. In decayed grass cuttings, August, September.

M. longicollis Gyll.

*Scymnus frontalis (F.). North Hill, Minehead. One in house porch, April.

Heteromera.

*Abdera flexuosa (Pk.). Holford. In fungoid growth on alder and willow, May. Very local.

Melandrya caraboides (L.). Berrow. On old tree stump lying on the sands, June.

Scaphidema metallicum (F.). Dunster. One crawling on turf just above beach. Usually found in decaying branches and old tree stumps. Local.

Lamellicornia.

Aphodius equestris (Pz.). Horner Woods. Plentiful in horse dung, May. Very local; previously recorded from Stratton-on-the Fosse district between 1931-32 (A. A. Allen, Ent. mon. Mag. 71).

*A. plagiatus (L.). Alcombe marshes. On muddy edge of dyke, June. Rarely occurs in dung like the rest of the genus. The general habitat is in damp places, under stones, in flood refuse, etc. Local.

Phytophaga.

Donacia clavipes F. One found on boat between Weston-super-Mare and Steep Holm, May.

Chrysolina hyperici (Forst.). North Hill, Minehead; Watchet Warren. Very abundant on Hypericum spp. in late spring and early summer. A. D. Imms mentions in Insect Natural History that this species had been one of the insects introduced into Australia during 1917 in an attempt to control Hypericum perforatum which had found its way into that country in 1870 and had since become a widespread pest, eliminating pasture grasses and proving poisonous to stock. The beetle has become established locally and is increasing.

*Aphthona venustula Kutsch. Asham Woods, Downhead. On Euphorbia amygdaloides (wood spurge), May. Local.

Psylliodes affinis (Pk.). Watchet Warren. On Solanum dulcamara (bittersweet), August. Local.

Rhynchophora.

- Platyrhinus resinosus (Scop.). Collard Hill, Compton Dundon. On Daldinia concentrica growing on ash, May. Previously recorded in similar habitat from Long Ashton in 1919 (C. T. Gimingham, Ent. mon. Mag. 55) and Stratton-on-the-Fosse district between 1931-32 (A. A. Allen, Ent. mon. Mag. 71). Rare.
- Apoderus coryli (L.). Horner Woods. On hazel, May. A very conspicuous insect as it sits on the leaves in the sun. Previously recorded from West Hatch in 1947 (A. H. Turner).
- *Barynotus moerens (F.). Asham Woods, Downhead; May. Local and as a rule, not common.
- Larinus planus (F.). North Hill, Minehead. On thistles; the larvae live in the flower heads of the plants; May. Very local.
- *Caulotrupis aeneopiceus (Boh.). North Hill, Minehead. Abundant in dead elder wood. Local.
- *Eremotes ater (L.). Hawkcombe, Porlock. Two specimens of this uncommon wood borer were found during June in a decayed pine stump. A further intensive search the next day for more beetles proved fruitless. This was hardly unexpected, as the area was by that time swarming with Formica rufa.
- *Sibinia primita (Hbst.). North Hill, Minehead. Occasionally taken during spring and early summer in garden on Cruciferae, chiefly Alyssum maritimum. Very local.
- Rhinoncus inconspectus (Hbst.). Minehead. Several swept from Polygonum spp. in damp meadow by a stream during August. Very local. Previously recorded from Uphill in 1951 and Westonsuper-Mare (Fowler, Brit. Coleoptera).
- *Orobitis cyaneus (L.). North Hill, Minehead. Found hibernating in November under cut grass in field. The larvae live in the seedpods of *Viola canina* (dog violet). The beetle, a small shining bluish black globose insect, could easily be passed over as a seed when legs and rostrum are retracted. Local.
- *Mononychus punctum-album (Hbst.). Berrow. Taken on buttercup flowers in June. The larvae feed in the seed-pods of *Iris* foetidissima (fetid iris). Very local.
- *Hylastinus obscurus (Marsh). North Hill, Minehead. Two
- *Phloeophthorus rhododactylus (Marsh). species of bark beetles found under bark of dead wood on Ulex europaeus (furze) in November. In the case of P. rhododactylus the beetles appeared

to be hibernating at the end of the larval burrows and were usually found in pairs. The majority of H. obscurus found were dead. Local.
