The twenty-fifth Annual Meeting was held at Taunton Castle, on 2 May 1935, Dr. Watson, President, in the chair. Fifteen other members were present. After the minutes were read and the accounts, showing a balance in hand of £8 12s. 1d. passed, the usual 10s. was voted to the upkeep of the Sharpham Moor Plot. The Report was presented and adopted, and all officers were re-elected. Places were suggested for field days, the final arrangements being left to the president and secretary. Some interesting plants were exhibited by members. Sympathetic reference was made to the long illness of Miss I. M. Roper, who had been so regular and useful an attender at these meetings. She died at a nursing home in Bristol on 8 June and will be much missed at these and other gatherings of naturalists.

The first field day was held on 23 May at Adcombe, under the leadership of Mr. C. J. Bartlett. Twenty-five members were present, the afternoon being pleasant and sunny. After leaving Corfe the party mounted the hill through the woods (by kind permission of Mrs. Dunbar). Among the plants noticed were Herb. Paris and a fine colony of Elecampane. Owing to the late spring no orchids were seen.

On 20 June nineteen members, with Mr. E. J. Hamlin as leader, met at Burton, near Stogursey, and walked across the fields to Shurton Bars. Considerable time was spent there, and the searchers' efforts were rewarded by finding Narrow-leaved Flax, Grass-leaved Vetchling, Bee Orchid, Pyramidal Orchid, Adder's Tongue, Trifolium maritimum and T. striatum. After tea at the Burton Inn the party visited Cannington Park Quarry, finding Wormwood, Henbit, Trifolium subterraneum,

T. striatum var. erectum, Sedum album, S. reflexum and (unexpectedly) many fine specimens of Bee Orchid. The Cheddar Pink, introduced many years ago by Mr. H. Corder, was flourishing on the cliff face. A few enthusiastic members afterwards explored the 'Park' itself, adding to the day's records Small-flowered Crowfoot, Lesser Broomrape and Fiddle Dock.

The Annual Conference of the South-Western Naturalists' Union was held at Ilfracombe from 7–10 June. An interesting meeting resulted, but few of our members were able to attend.

On 4 July Dr. Watson conducted a very successful survey of the vegetation of the R. Tone and the canal at Taunton under much more favourable conditions than in the similar expedition last year. All the duckweeds, including Wolffia, were seen, but no flowers were observed owing to the relative coldness of the water. The aquatic vegetation was fully a fortnight later than in 1934 but some of the Potamogetons were found in flower. In a sandy inlet of the river were several grasses of an alien or casual nature which had not previously been found in S. Somerset (v.c. 5). Mimulus was noted to have extended down the river at Firepool.

Twenty-three members and friends met on 25 July at Shap-wick under the leadership of Mr. H. Corder. The moor on the east side of the road from the station to the village was worked before lunch, and the west side afterwards. This was a very interesting day, but nothing unusual was noted beyond a

particularly extensive colony of Osmunda.

On 3 October a most interesting and delightful Fungus Foray was conducted by Mr. Hadden in Horner Woods. Over a hundred species were obtained and included some of the very poisonous fungi as the fly agaric (Amanita muscaria) and the death-cup (A. pantherina). Mutinus caninus, the lesser stinkhorn, was also seen. During the tea interval the fungi were named and shown on a separate table, and with their varied shapes and diversified colours, made a wonderful display. This new departure in our activities was much appreciated and thoroughly enjoyed by the fifteen members present.
