Report of the Curator of the Somerset County Guseum, from July 18, 1928, to July 9 (Annual Deeting), 1929

My last report made special reference to the benefactions of Mr. William Wyndham. Since the Wyndham Lecture Hall was opened in October 1927 it has been found to be of great service, not only to the Wyndham Lecture Trusts for the Elementary and Secondary Schools, but for occasional meetings of the Somersetshire Archæological and Natural History Society and its branches, and for other educational lectures organized by other societies.

The development of the Tone House property, which Mr. Wyndham bought for the Society in 1927 and is mentioned in my last report, is still being considered by a committee which is, however, for the time being, hampered by the lack of funds to carry out even the first part of the proposed scheme for museum extension. The crowding of specimens is, therefore,

unavoidable, until some relief comes.

The excavations at Taunton Castle were continued during the autumn of 1928 and spring of 1929, and owing to the extent of Norman and other walling discovered in the area under examination, it has been decided not to erect any modern buildings in this situation, as was originally intended before it was known that so much remained of the old Castle buried under hundreds of tons of earth, stone and other débris.

The Committee's tentative decision had to be entirely revised, and the Society has now been left with the additional responsibility of completing the excavations,—to be followed by the protection and repair of the ancient walls. All this will require money, and a large amount will have to be raised before

the excavations can be completed, and at least some part of

the proposed Museum extension carried out.

The Society has made a point of paying attention to the matter of archæological excavations in the county in recent years, and the programme for 1928–29 was very full, and included Glastonbury Abbey, the Meare Lake Village, Ham Hill, Kingsdown Camp and Camerton. The explorations entail a large amount of detailed work and research, and afford also a means of enriching the museum with a more or less constant flow of new archæological material. Some of the chief discoveries made in 1928 were shown at the Exhibition of British Archæology at University College, London, held in February 1929.

The Library—now one of the finest of its kind in the West of England—is of considerable value to members of the Society, and was used to good effect in the preparations made for the Taunton Historical Pageant, 1928. The signatures of all those who took part in the pageant are preserved in a book which has been presented to the library. Further accommodation will soon be required for the housing of the library. Mr. Charbonnier has given some very useful books on English pottery. The collection of manuscripts continues to be classified by Colonel H. R. Phipps. The most important accessions in this department are the valuable manuscripts relating to the See of Bath and Wells (dating from the time of Henry VII), given by the President, Mr. Ernest E. Baker, F.S.A.

On 17 June 1929, Taunton Castle and the excavations were visited by the Mayor and Corporation of Taunton, who were entertained to tea by the Society. For that occasion the chief 'finds' from these excavations were exhibited in one of the museum rooms, where they have remained, temporarily arranged, for visitors to see on application. Eventually they will be exhibited in the museum proper.

The collection of stone implements is growing steadily, and the Janes and Selley collections of Neolithic implements from Mendip have been catalogued, etc.

The collections of coins, tokens and medals are constantly increasing, and fifty specimens of the late Roman coins from the Weymouth Bay hoard have been presented to the museum.

The Botanical Section held a general meeting at headquarters on 27 February, and the Microscopical Section on 17 January 1929. The Entomological Section held its annual meeting on 5 March. The Ornithological Section had its autumn meeting on 11 October 1928, and the annual meeting took place on 19 March 1929. The Taunton Field Club also had meetings in the Wyndham Hall on 5 December, 21 February and 4 April. For the Parent Society, Mr. Wilfred M. Webb lectured on the 'Natural History of the Dinner Table', on 29 November 1928.

The Somersetshire Archæological and Natural History Society consisted of 1,052 members in July 1929, including eighteen life members and three honorary members. The rules of the Society have been entirely revised and expressed in greater detail than previously.

The Museum and Library were visited by 8,302 persons in 1924, 7,763 in 1925, 8,289 in 1926, 8,650 in 1927, and 8,866 in 1928.

I. ARCHÆOLOGY

(1). STONE IMPLEMENTS

Collection of flint implements of Neolithic type, found by the late Mr. William Holwill Janes on the surface on Mendip, and presented by his sister, Miss E. Janes, of Wookey Hole.

A number of the specimens are unmarked, but it is understood they were picked up on the surface of Mendip in the neighbourhood of Priddy; others, again, are marked 'Mendip Hills' only. The remainder were found, for the most part, in the parish of St. Cuthbert Without,—at Arthur's Point, Bishops Lot, Rookham, Lower Milton ('Warren'), and Eastwater; also at Higher Pitts Farm, parish of Wookey, the Ebbor Rocks (including 'Sleight'), in the parishes of St. Cuthbert Without and Wookey. Less than half-a-dozen specimens came from mouth of Wookey Hole, Deerleap (west of Ebbor), and Priddy Nine Barrows. There are a few arrowheads in the collection, including two or three of first-class workmanship.

Miss Janes also presented: Three flint implements from Dorset, an arrowhead and scraper from Sussex, a finely-worked whetstone from the Glastonbury Lake-village, a stone axe from Victoria, Australia, an arrowhead, N. America, a stone spindlewhorl, and a flat stone, pierced.

Stone celt, or axe, of Neolithic type, ground on all surfaces, Picked up by the donor on the N. side of Greenway Road. Taunton, in a field opposite Mr. H. Clarke's nurseries,—land

being converted into an extension of the existing nurseries on the s. side of the road, 1929.

The bevelled edge of the implement is well polished; the sides are squared, and the butt-end is bevelled and fairly sharp. Length 84 mm. $(3\frac{5}{16}$ in.); width at cutting-edge 53 mm. $(2\frac{1}{8}$ in.); max. thickness about 25 mm.

The actual spot is a few yards N. of the letter 'A' in 'Greenway' Road in the 6 in. O.S., Som. LXX, N.E. (reprint 100/11).

Stone 'mace-head', or perforated 'hammer', found in digging for building at Luccombe, end of May 1929; depth 4ft. Probably late Neolithic or early Bronze Age.

It is of oval outline and bi-convex in cross-section. In length it measures $3\frac{5}{16}$ in. (85 mm.); width $2\frac{11}{16}$ in. (69 mm.); thickness, nearly 1 in. (25 mm.). The central perforation is of the 'hour-glass' form, having a medial diameter of 15 mm.

Its surface has been ground and rubbed smooth, but not polished. It has been accidentally damaged, a rather large piece of the stone having been flaked off.

(2). Miscellaneous

The Antiquities found during the thirteenth season's excavations at the Meare Lake Village, field no 2, in August-September 1928, under the direction of Dr. Arthur Bulleid and Mr. H. St. George Gray.—Presented by the Somerset County Council.

Bronze scabbard, of La Tène II period (B.C. 250–150), found by a workman named Walter Crane in peat-digging on Meare Heath, in the parish of Meare, Somerset, at a depth of 4–5 ft., on land belonging to Harold Luke Baker of Lake House (Post Office), Meare, about 22 August 1928. It was found about 350 yards N.E. of Great Plain Farm, and $\frac{1}{2}$ -mile N.W. of Ashcott-and-Meare Railway Station.—Purchased.

The scabbard is 30^{5}_{16} in. (769 mm.) in length, formed of two thin bronze plates with shagreen finish. The chape is of a somewhat pointed heart shape similar to one found in the Thames near London. Its weight is 502 grammes. It is fully described by H. St. George Gray, F.S.A., in *The Antiquaries Journal*, vol. x, April part, where it is well illustrated.

Socketed celt of bronze, looped. Found towards the end of August 1928 by William Vowles on Meare Heath, Somerset, on property belonging to the Eclipse Peat Company (Mr. Alexander), at a depth of about 3 ft. The position was about 300 yards N.E. of Great Plain Farm, and about 50 yards nearer the farm than the bronze scabbard above mentioned.

The loop of this implement is somewhat slender. The socket is of a somewhat squared oval form inside. Both surfaces are ornamented and strengthened by three almost vertical ribbings. Length 106 mm. ($4\frac{1}{8}$ in.); width at edge $41\cdot5$ mm. The socket still contains some of the wood of the haft, and the finder stated that most of the handle was in the ground. Weight (without wood) $189\cdot34$ grammes.

Palstave of bronze in a good state of preservation. Found at Athelney (on the slopes of the Isle of Athelney, exact spot unknown), *circ*. 1908.

It has a sharp, crescentic cutting-edge, width $65\cdot3$ mm. Length 167 mm. $(6\frac{5}{8}$ in.). Max. thickness at the flanges, $35\cdot2$ mm. These flanges become merged in the stop-ridge. Weight $429\cdot72$ grammes.

Deposited on loan by Mr. Morris Williams.

Basket-work—perhaps part of a cradle—found in the foundation under the clay floors of Mound XXXIV, Meare Lake Village, 1928. The cleaning of this material was done mainly by Mrs. Clark (nèe Nancy Bulleid), and the glass dishes in which the exhibit is made were given by Dr. A. Bulleid, F.S.A.

A few pieces of briquetage (similar to that found at the Red Hills, Essex, and Edington, Som.), found in clay dug from a elay-pit at a brickyard on the s. side of Burnham Level, Burnham-on-Sea, 1927.—Given by Mr. T. Floyd Norris.

The following specimens found on Ham Hill, Stoke-under-Ham: Small chalk spindlewhorl, diam. 27.5 mm., half a small glass ring, three fragments of pottery, cut tine of red-deer antler, 'third brass' coins (2) of Constantine I and Constans.—Given by Dr. S. L. BRIMBLECOMBE.

II. ETHNOGRAPHY

Needlework picture, from a water-colour sketch of a piece of Somerset scenery, the work of Mrs. Forrester Wood, of Bettws-y-coed, N. Wales (whose parents belonged to Somerset).

The work is done in filoselles on plain but very fine apron-linen, upon which the picture is drawn faintly in pencil. The subjects are all taken from Mrs. Forrester Wood's own water-colour drawings, but no paint is used on the linen.

Two banners of the Five Years' Benefit Society of Strattonon-the-Fosse worked in several colours.

- (1) One bears the initial G.IV.R. surrounding Royal crown, and has a small Britannia worked upon it; this banner is marked in one corner, 'Crouch Tailor Stoke Lane May 24, 1830'.
- (2) The other banner bears a rude figure of Britannia with dove and olive branch above; on one side at the top (both faces) Union Jack iu red and fawn, on other side V.R. and crown; at bottom (both faces) clasped hands and two hearts conjoined; inscribed 'Our Trust is in God'.

Teazle-knife, the iron shank passing through the length of the antler handle; length $4\frac{3}{8}$ in.; resembles a miniature billhook.

It belonged to John Richards of Melksham Forest (grandfather of the donor, who was 90 years of age when he died about fifty years ago). John was for many years leading postillion, between Marlborough and Devizes, of the London-Bristol Mail Coach.

Teazle-growing is described by J. H. Billingsley in 'General View of the Agriculture of the County of Somerset', 1797.

Solid dipper or hand-bowl, of maple-wood; length with handle $11\frac{1}{2}$ in., diam. at rim $6\frac{1}{2}$ in.; weight 9 oz.; considerably worm-eaten; early XIX Century.—Given by Mr. George Perret (per Mr. S. Lloyd Harvey).

Cup of ash, turned, now somewhat worm-eaten; 4 in. in diam., holds eight fluid oz., weight 3 oz. Found in a cottage near St. Mary's Church, Writhlington, built in the masonry on the beam over the centre of a window.—Given by Mr. F. Swift, c.c., Radstock (per Mr. S. Lloyd Harvey).

Small wooden snuff-box, length 48 mm., of bi-convex cross-section; XIX Century.—Given by Mr. S. LLOYD HARVEY.

Combined quill-pen-cutter and pocket-knife, length $3\frac{3}{4}$ in.; end of XIX Century.—Given by the Very Rev. Father E. HORNE, F.S.A.

Handcuffs dug out of the hedge at the back of Govier's yard, Chip Lane, Taunton, 1929.—Given by Mr. A. J. VICKERY.

Baby's cap, probably early XIX Century.—Given by Miss C. G. Powell.

Pair of steel snuffers, length $6\frac{3}{8}$ in. — Given by Mr. J. POYNER.

'Star' pattern terret for horse-harness, height $3\frac{1}{2}$ in. Found by the donor in the 'old quarry', Wells Hill, Radstock, 1910.

III. CHINA, POTTERY, AND GLASS

Puzzle-jug of Crock Street pottery; height $7\frac{7}{8}$ in.; earlier part of the XIX Century.

The inscriptions on the jug have been scratched by a very illiterate hand, and some parts are practically unreadable:

"E. BINHAM, Broadway hill, Ilminster: Fill me full of licker seet, for it is good when frinds do meet", etc.
